Hundred Years War

- 1337-1453 (actually <u>116 years</u>)
- France v. England
- Began as a fight about who would be the French king
- Continued as fight for <u>land</u>, control of <u>trade goods</u>, and over who would <u>rule</u> France
- Mostly <u>fought</u> in France
- Many battles--both sides won some, lost some
- Who won in the end?
 - France!

Hundred Years War


• Results:

- <u>Unification</u> of France: became more of a <u>nation</u>, rather than a group of <u>feudal</u> states
- Popularity of the English <u>longbow</u>
- Strengthened French <u>power</u>



Henry V (5th)

- King of England from 1413-1422
- First king to actually speak <u>English</u> since the Norman invasion in 1066
- Responsible for winning several key <u>battles</u> in France, including Agincourt
- Was briefly king of <u>France</u>
- Died in 1422 of <u>battlefield dysentery</u>



Joan of Arc

- French <u>peasant girl</u>
- Heard and saw <u>visions</u> from God
- Convinced the king of <u>France</u> to let her help lead an <u>army</u>
- Helped save city of <u>Orleans</u> and the <u>French</u>
- Eventually <u>captured</u> by the British
- Even with no evidence, she was <u>burned</u> at the stake as a <u>heretic</u>
